She was in the second cohort of the Coldiron Senior Nurse Executive Fellowship in the Marian K. Shaughnessy Nurse Leadership Academy.

Dr. O'Hanlon Curry started her career at Memorial Sloan Kettering Cancer Center in 1993 as a staff nurse and began her advance practice career in 1998. In 2004, she joined The Children's Hospital at Montefiore in Bronx, NY as the nurse manager for the outpatient pediatric hematology/oncology program, along with the advanced practice providers, to assist in revitalizing the program. In 2018, Dr. O'Hanlon Curry joined the team at the University of Texas MD Anderson Cancer Center as the Administrative Director, Pediatric Clinical Services Children's Cancer Hospital. She joined Mount Sinai in February 2023 as the Director of Nursing, Oncology and Palliative Care. She returned to MD Anderson in January 2024.

Dr. O'Hanlon has been an active member of the Association of Pediatric Hematology Oncology Nurses (APHON) serving 2 terms as treasurer and is a past president of national APHON. Dr. O'Hanlon Curry is also a member of the Children's Oncology Group and has been the responsible Investigator Nurse at both The Children's Hospital at Montefiore and the Children's Cancer Hospital at MD Anderson along with being a nurse auditor. She is currently on the advocacy committee for APHON, and the Friends of the National Institute of Nursing Research (FNINR). 1. Statement describing the biggest issue facing AONL and potential strategies to address the issue.
